The City of Simi Valley/Waterworks District No. 8 customers are required to follow these permanent water use mandates:

- Irrigate before 9:00 a.m. or after 5:00 p.m.
- Irrigate no more than 15 minutes per day, per irrigation station/zone; this limit does not apply to low-flow drip irrigation and high-efficiency sprinklers
- Eliminate excessive irrigation flow and/or runoff; use multiple short irrigation cycles to minimize runoff, if needed
- No irrigation of turf in City street medians
- No watering during and 48 hours after measurable rainfall
- Cease washing exterior hard surfaces such as sidewalks and driveways
- Wash vehicles using a hose equipped with a trigger shut-off nozzle
- Use recirculated water in decorative fountains, features and commercial car washes
- Fix leaks, breaks, or malfunctions promptly
- Serve water only upon request at restaurants and food service establishments
- Provide guests the option to decline daily linen service at hotels and motels
- No installation of single-pass cooling systems in new buildings
